- Embrace your unique voice. There are many types of voices, and just because yours is different doesn't necessarily mean that it's bad.
- There is no true right or wrong voice.
- Singing, especially in church, is about the happiness and meaning the act brings you, not necessarily about how you sound.
- Concentrate on group singing. Your voice may blend better when singing with the congregation or the choir.

RECEIPTS For Income Tax Purposes: The 2022 tax receipts have been printed and will be available the week of February 14th.

How much does it cost to have a Mass said?

1) An announced Mass intention is a donation of \$20; an unannounced Mass is \$10.

2) An intention may be placed well ahead of time if you want a specific date.

3) Intentions do not have to be for the deceased; you can also ask that a Mass be offered up in thanksgiving, for a birthday or other worthy causes.

How to donate to the Church in memory of someone special? Donations to the Restoration Fund of St. John the Evangelist Church or for St. Philomena Church can be done anytime. Place a cheque in an envelope along with your name, address and your special intention. A tax receipt will be forwarded at year-end.
